
## Literature, Language, & Writing

### 1. Annie Dillard's Pilgrim at Tinker Creek at 50

Annie Dillard's Pilgrim at Tinker Creek, published when the author was 28 and set in Roanoke, appeared in 1974 and won the Pulitzer Prize in 1975. It's one of the great works of what we would now call creative non-fiction. This course will give us a chance to read (or re-read) the

book together, under and alongside the very skies and shadows and creeks she writes about. We'll spend three weeks marveling with her at the natural world and tracing out her intense, brilliantly realized responses. We'll spend our last week looking at short excerpts from books that have built on this masterpiece.

#### **INSTRUCTOR**

Tom Gardner is emeritus professor of English at Virginia Tech. His most recent books are Lyric Theology: Art and the Doctrine of Creation (with a chapter on Annie Dillard) and Sundays, a collection of 52 short lyric essays. His Poverty Creek Journal was just reprinted in London on its tenth anniversary.

### 2. Jane Austen Book Club: Northanger Abbey and Mansfield Park

LLI's Jane Austen Book Club is back to continue our lively literary pilgrimage through the author's six novels. This time we'll focus on Northanger Abbey and Mansfield Park. The first of these "house" novels, a spirited parody of the Gothic novel, was composed while the author

was in her early twenties but was published posthumously. The second was Austen's third published novel, finished when she was in her late thirties and controversial ever since.

As before, the course will take a casual book-group discussion approach. No previous experience of reading Austen is necessary. Newcomers are always welcome to the "club."

### 3. Appreciating Toni Morrison's Beloved

Readers of Toni Morrison's earlier fiction have often been confused by her 1987 novel Beloved. In this six-week course, offered at the request of LLI participants, we will demystify Morrison's so-called "ghost story," and through close reading and lively discussions, discover the novel's

complex and rich meanings. At heart, the novel tells multiple love stories, while at the same time it dramatizes the effects of slavery on human relationships. Though many have considered it a novel about slavery, it is primarily about slavery's long-term impact on the enslaved.

Morrison, Beloved (any edition)

#### **INSTRUCTOR**

Virginia Fowler, professor emerita of English at Virginia Tech, taught American literature and African American literature for more than 40 years. Her research has focused on Toni Morrison's fiction and Nikki Giovanni's poetry.

### 4. Memoir and Essay Writing

We're in an age of essays and memoirs. Some become bestsellers or films; many others, self-published, are composed for friends and family. In this class, students read innovative and award-winning personal nonfiction, draft their own, and share their writing with classmates. The instructor provides exercises, prompts, and ideas for developing the work. Based on the richly collaborative workshop model — receiving peers' insights and commenting helpfully in turn — the class makes learning less narrowly instructor-based and brings more brainpower to each memoir or personal essay.

Beginning and intermediate writers are welcome. Enthusiasm and a desire to write are the core prerequisites!

#### **INSTRUCTOR**

**Richard Gilbert** is a freelance editor of personal and narrative nonfiction. He's author of *Shepherd: A Memoir*, a finalist for the Ohioana Book Award, about his family's decade-long farming adventure in Appalachian Ohio. His essay "Animals Saved Me" won the *Hunger Mountain* Creative Nonfiction Prize.

### 5. From Page to Screen: Remarkable Literary Film Adaptations

Great books have been sources for thousands of films since moviemaking began. However, books and films are two different art forms. What makes a remarkable film adaptation? What elements of



great literature translate well to screen, and what elements are often missed or translated in controversial ways? These are a few of the questions we'll ponder as we discuss film adaptations of *To Kill a Mockingbird* (1962), *The Color Purple* (1985, 2023), *One Flew Over the Cuckoo's Nest* (1975), and *Emma* (1996, 2020).

Participants are encouraged (but not required) to read the original novels before the film discussion.

#### **REQUIRED TEXT**

Participants will need to view the films listed below before the class session in which each is discussed. Either rent, stream, or check them out from the library:

### 6. The Parables of Jesus: Messages Hidden in Plain Sight

Although Jesus did not invent the genre of the parable - a short, evocative story that teaches by comparison, illustration or analogy - he was a master of this art. In this six-week course, we will analyze and classify the parables of Jesus, paying close attention to the way they speak to his audience and enable new understandings about the Kingdom of God. Close reading will reveal multiple layers to these deceptively simple stories; they are brief and homely enough to connect with listeners and have immediate impact, but they linger in the mind to prompt subsequent realizations.

The instructor will distribute a handout containing the text of the parables we will study.

#### INSTRUCTOR

**Russell Gregory** is an emeritus professor of religious studies at Radford University. He has an abiding interest in the literature of the Bible and focuses on narrative analysis.

### 7. Mystery Misfits

Mystery subgenres abound; you might be a fan of the cozy, hardboiled, or courtroom mystery, the police procedural, or the thriller. In this class, we explore mysteries that straddle or resist genre classification. The charming detective in Dean James's classic cozy, *Posted to Death*, happens to be a vampire. In Vicky Delaney's *A Three Book Problem*, the world of Sherlock Holmes infuses the investigation when a bookstore devoted to his works becomes a crime scene. And in Josi Havari's *Nest Egg* series, mystery, romance, humor, and tropical beauty blend when a city girl inherits an egg farm in Hawaii.

Britton Gildersleeve, a retired faculty member and administrator from Oklahoma State University, has been a mystery reader since age eight, when she first read the Nancy Drew series and her father's Sherlock Holmes. Since then, mysteries of almost all types (including those that tease the genre!) have been a favorite distraction.

### 8. True Crime in American Storytelling

From the early days of the republic to contemporary times, Americans seem to be more than usually obsessed by the genre of true crime. In this five-week course, we will explore the historical roots of this obsession and trace its continuing transformation into new media forms. As we consider notable examples of the genre, we will ask ourselves: Why are Americans so fascinated by true crime? How do race, gender, class, and other components of identity affect the story that is told? What are the ethics of consuming a genre that seems to exploit and sensationalize human suffering?

### **REQUIRED TEXT**

All required texts and videos will be available online.

#### INSTRUCTOR

Ingrid Johnson, advanced instructor in Virginia Tech's Department of English, is an award-winning teacher and director of the department's Distinguished Alumni Board. In Spring 2025, 500 students signed up for her course, True Crime in American Storytelling.

### 9. Read Local: Ed Falco's *Transcendent Gardening*

The Read Local series focuses on a single book written by a local or regional author. Readers engage with the author face-to-face in stimulating conversation during the first and last meetings.

Set in the North Georgia mountains, Ed Falco's *Transcendent Gardening* is the story of Angel Maso, a gardener and would-be playwright, whose life quietly unravels after his wife divorces him. While she adjusts well to her new life, and their daughter proves wildly successful as a social media entrepreneur, Angel ekes out a livelihood as a gardener and part-time teacher. When all that falls apart, so does Angel, with consequences that shake both his hometown and the nation. This novel about a mass shooting, told from the point of view of the shooter, is certain to prompt important conversations.

But we will also discover trends among burials that transcend their specific time and place and speak to us today.

Subjects of her recent research include the plaster casts used at world's fairs in the 20th century, souvenirs associated with Rome and the Grand Tour. and portraiture of women in the eighteenth century.

### 21. "Unnatural Disasters": What We Can Learn from the Women of Katrina

Women are 70% of the world's poor and are especially and adversely impacted by climate change and consequent disasters. Scholars rightly call these "unnatural disasters," where social inequities prior to the disaster, as defined by age, disability, class, race, or gender, result in greater harm to vulnerable populations. In this course, we will explore several examples of this phenomenon globally, but we will focus primarily on Hurricane Katrina's impact on New Orleans in August 2005. How did the city's women fare and cope? How did race and class factor into the outcomes? What can we learn from their experiences?

Three dozen grape varieties from these regions will be tasted in this class.

### 61. How Research Saved the Red-cockaded Woodpecker

The Red-cockaded Woodpecker is unique in excavating its cavities in living pine trees, and unusual in living in family groups. In the 1980s there were no increasing populations of the species, and it seemed headed for extinction. But studies led to a new understanding of the bird's social system, which, in turn, resulted in a new management paradigm. The outcome has been a radically changed trajectory for the Red-cockaded Woodpecker and ultimately its removal in 2024 from the endangered species list.




### 64. Bear Man Chainsaw Carving

Today, this craft features a diverse range of styles, skill levels, and themes, demonstrating that the true power of the art lies in the artist's

Jerry will demonstrate how he creates a bear carving - so bring ear plugs and eye protection if you have them (others can borrow). The field trip will start on the lawn in front of Mountain Lake Lodge to view the lakebed. We'll discuss the lake hydrology, the history of its fluctuating water levels and, of course, the filming of the movie *Dirty Dancing*. The next stop is a small quarry nearby to talk about the geologic history of the lake and its surrounding mountains and to enjoy a bit of fossil collecting. Finally, we will visit the natural landslide dam at the north end of the lake to learn about landslides, earthquakes, and factors responsible for creating the lake. The trip will end with a 20-minute hike into the rocky but magnificent terrain of the Garden of the Gods, the source area for the landslide debris that blocked the gorge allowing the lake to form. Some participants may wish to enjoy lunch in the Mountain Lake Lodge restaurant afterward.

Attendance at the free lecture on Mountain Lake on Thurs, Sept 18 at Warm Hearth is recommended but not required.






